Mission Statement

To provide Buffalo County residents, businesses and industries, non-profit organizations, emergency responders, volunteers, and local governments the education and support necessary to reduce the loss of life and human suffering; to minimize property damage and to protect the community from all types of disasters through a comprehensive, risk-based, all-hazard emergency management program.

Values Statement

Emergency Management is by function and by law a cooperative effort on the part of all levels of government and the private sector. At the local level, Emergency Management is concerned with the protection and education of the public from the hazards and risks that affect them. The credibility of the program resides in the credibility of the program advocate. The Emergency Manager should exemplify the utility of the emergency management program.

The job of the Emergency Manager is defined by law. It does, however, have a moral basis. The emergency manager must balance the duties authorized and required by law with the moral obligation of the public employee to do everything possible to protect and preserve the safety of citizens in the city and county.

Emergency Management expresses a strong commitment to provide interagency cooperation and coordination of activities relating to mitigation of, prevention of, preparedness for, response to, and recovery from disasters and emergencies.

Vision Statement

The goal of the Buffalo County Emergency Management Department is to educate the Citizens of Buffalo County about their ongoing role in preparing for emergencies through education, community outreach, and training. By creating an increased emphasis on disaster preparedness, the Buffalo County Emergency Management Department looks forward to reinforcing interdepartmental communications and cooperation throughout our county. By means of creating a community culture of preparedness and fostering partnerships with local public and private groups and businesses, it is our goal that Buffalo County will work as a community, with neighbor helping neighbor, when a disaster strikes.

ORGANIZATION

The Buffalo County Emergency Manager is an appointed position and is subject to the direction and control of the Buffalo County Board of Supervisors but is managed (supervised day-to-day) by the Buffalo County Sheriff and Kearney Chief of Police.

The position of the Buffalo County Emergency Manager is defined by law but nevertheless encompasses a moral obligation to balance his/her duties authorized and required by law with the moral obligation of the public employee to do everything possible to protect and preserve the safety of citizens within his/her community.

The incumbent is granted broad and extensive authority in determining program priorities and is responsible in determining the best way to support all local, state and national programs and objectives. The broad duties of this position include but not limited to the following:

- Articulate a strong commitment of interagency cooperation and work with all elected and appointed officials of all local, State and Federal governments.
- Maintain and manage the Emergency Operation Center and/or the mobile response unit.
- Provide coordination of all activities relating to the mitigation, prevention, preparedness, response, and recovery from disasters and/or emergencies.
- Serve as the principal advisor to the Buffalo County Board of Supervisors in emergency incidents.
- Manage, maintain, document, and appropriately utilize public and private resources.

Emergency Management Concept

This section describes the emergency management concept but it is not inclusive of the everyday meetings and activities of the Emergency Management Office for Buffalo County.

Comprehensive Emergency Management: The four phases of comprehensive emergency management are mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery. Each phase results from the previous one and establishes the requirements of the next. This past year the City of Kearney/ Buffalo County Emergency Management Office continued to focus on all four phases not only in training but real life emergency incidents, while planning and preparedness phase was the main focus due to several larger scale incidents recovery had a major focus.

The Four Phases of a comprehensive Emergency Management program is certainly simplified in the above paragraph. In addition, the Emergency Management department is responsible for:

- Reporting to a number of departments and agencies at the local, state and federal levels

- Meeting State and Federal mandates and requirements
- Maintaining outreach programs
- Grant management
- Maintaining emergency operations and equipment; for example, the Emergency Operation Center, Emergency Mobile Response unit, Recovery Unit, and Generators, etc.
- Volunteer management and coordination
- Attendance of continuing education, training, exercises and conferences
- Conducting training, drills, exercises and misc. planning activities
- Maintaining and operating a county wide ID credentialing system for County employees, Emergency Volunteers, EOC staff, county wide first responder agencies, appointed and elected officials, Jail service providers (volunteers and the Justice Center)
- Manage and maintain the county wide notification systems
- Provide annual budget to the Sheriff, Kearney Police Chief and the county board
- Complete claims and payroll
- Work with Emergency Management partners and develop and negotiate agreements such as contracts, MOA's, MOU's, and LOA's for the emergency program.

Emergency Operations Center (EOC): All EOC operations were handled at the lowest Emergency Management level and were never operational through one full operational period.

TRAINING



As required by the Nebraska Emergency Management Act, Section 81-829.46 (6), which requires the “*Director to devote full time to the duties of emergency management, and that he/she shall be qualified and certified in accord with criteria established for the state by the Nebraska Emergency Management Agency.*” The Director has completed the following:

- NEMA Basic Certification before being hired and again in (2012)
- NEMA's Advanced Certification for Emergency Management (2005)
- NIMS compliances I.S. 100, 200, 700, and 800 (2005)
- FEMA Professional Certification was obtained (2006)
- The NIMS 300 and 400 certification was accomplished (2007)
- NIMS 701, 702, 703 and 704 certification was completed (2010)

On a continual basis the Director discovers training opportunities such as continuing education, new technologies, online classes, regional training and conferences, etc. In 2014, the Director sent 24 assorted local or regional training opportunities to First Responder agencies.

Additional training and exercises planned, conducted and participated in this year are as follows.

At the direction of the emergency management administration, the training and continuing education for the emergency management office has been reduced this past year and for the years to come.

STATE / FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS

4. Update Local Emergency Operations Plan on an annual basis+
5. Complete online grant documents (BISR, and GMS)
6. Complete performance quarterly reports
7. Annually update online NIMS-Cast documents


LOCAL EMERGENCY PLANNING COMMITTEE (LEPC)

The Buffalo County LEPC has been a beneficial component of the emergency management program and it operated as a valuable program for all Emergency Management departments within the region. However, five years ago the LEPC committee became less and less active in Buffalo County due to a general lack of interest, low participation levels of key stakeholders and ultimately the necessary prioritization by the director. The Emergency Management Director, being an office of one, has continually faced increased time demands since the 9/11 evolution of Emergency Management. At this time, the Emergency Management Office faced a time management tipping point that demanded tough decisions of how one person can achieve the duties of this office and the decision to place the LEPC (committee) in an inactive status was reluctantly made.

It should be noted the Director still fulfills all LEPC requirements such as business walk through, required reviews; maintaining Tier II reports; creating a compilation report of all Tier II's; filing reports with the SERC (State Emergency Response Commission) county fire departments, county hazmat team and the Buffalo County Board; updates the LEOP with the report; and maintains spill reports throughout the year.

The Director believes the Buffalo County LEPC should be revitalized when it becomes possible to increase the office staff with the addition of an Emergency Management Deputy in the Emergency Management Office.


REPORTS



All copies of Tier II reports filed by facilities in Buffalo County, that are required by the Community Right-To-Know Act to report hazardous substances, are placed on file in the Emergency Management Director's office. The facilities are required to update the reports on an annual basis and are reviewed by the Director for the HAZMAT Annex of the LEOP. A compiled TIER II report by the Buffalo County Emergency Manager is sent to the SERC and the Buffalo County Board Members for their review. This report is also sent to the City of Kearney point of contact, Police Chief Dan Lynch.

CONTINGENCY PLANS

The Director maintains all contingency plans filed by facilities in Buffalo County that are required to file the plans, or do so because they understand the importance of providing the information for emergency planning and response.



RMP (RISK MANAGEMENT PLANS)

Eleven facilities in Buffalo County were required by law to file Risk Management Plans. This is a requirement by the EPA. The Risk Management Plans are on file in the Director's office and are also available on the secure portion of the EPA website. The following is a list of the RMP facilities:

The Director receives notification involving radioactive transports of spent fuel and low specific activity materials prior to the shipments entering Buffalo County. Notices are made to the appropriate agencies that would respond in a Hazardous Material or Radiological incident. There were only a few notifications and schedule changes sent out to the Emergency Managers throughout the year.

Very few notifications of transportation through Buffalo County of low level waste were received by local emergency management. This is a significant decrease from the 2013 year when there were 47 notifications received by emergency management.



EMERGENCY WARNING SYSTEM

The Emergency Operation Center (EOC) and the Backup Dispatch Center are primary locations for weather operations supporting all of Buffalo County. The EOC was not fully operational 24 hours a day and 7 days a week during severe weather season this last year like it was in 2013. The EOC and Backup Dispatch Center was not opened and operational during all thunderstorm warnings, tornado watches or warnings. In the opinion of emergency management this has caused some issues making it more difficult for emergency management to do its job during these times. Trying to keep up on the storm activity, communicate with the National Weather Service, storm spotters, and sounding the sirens for public warning. During these times additional trained personnel should be in the EOC to support storm activities, from dispatchers, amateur radio staff, and event recorders to record weather activity and provide social media updates.

Monthly tests of the alarm radios, pagers and outdoor warning systems were conducted throughout the year. Pre-maintenance services on the sirens were conducted during the month of March before the spring severe weather season within the Kearney area. The monthly tests of the outdoor warning sirens were conducted out of the EOC, Fire Station II and the Primary Dispatch at the Law Enforcement Center. 2014 Emergency Management Overview

This is an overview of the 2014 annual report and its purpose is to highlight the major activities of the Buffalo County / City of Kearney Emergency Management office.

Test of Emergency Warning Systems (Alarm radios, pagers and outdoor sirens)	
01-02-2014	Outdoor warning sirens test was successful.
02-02-2014	Outdoor warning sirens test was successful.

03-06-2014	Outdoor warning sirens test was successful.
04-03-2014	The outdoor warning sirens for Buffalo County were tested twice in April. Once at the Primary Dispatch Center and once at the Emergency Operation Center. No issues were found during the testing with the exception of the siren near the Stagecoach in Kearney on 3 rd Avenue was reported as not working.
05-01-2014	The outdoor warning sirens near the Stagecoach in Kearney on 3 rd Avenue and on Grand Ave (near the Valley View trailer courts) were reported as not working. Both were checked out by Platte Valley Communications and both were found to be in working order.
06-05-2014	Outdoor warning sirens test was successful.
07-03-2014	Outdoor warning sirens test was successful.
08-03-2014	On August 30 th the Cottonmill area experienced a short 15-30 second power outage. When Power came back on, the outdoor warning siren sounded at the Cottonmill Lake. Power was turned off to the siren and reset.
09-04-2014	Both of the sirens in Pleasanton were reported to not be working during the test. An individual test was conducted the following day. Both sirens worked at that time. Platte Valley Communications was called in to determine the cause as to why the sirens did not sound during the test. I am not sure an exact cause was found. The North Siren in Pleasanton was taken down by the local community to be rebuilt by Noller Electric.
10-02-2014	The North Siren in Pleasanton had been refurbished and put back up by the local community and Noller Electric. The Siren on UNK campus was reported not to be working on the last test. I will sit on this siren on the next test in November.
11-06-14	The Siren on UNK campus and the Cottonmill siren were reported not to be working on the last test. Platte Valley Communications has been contacted to look at these sirens.
12-04-14	The Siren on UNK campus was still not working on the last test, and the siren at Cottonmill Lake worked during the last test. Platte Valley Communications has been contacted to look at these sirens however had not had a chance to look at them before the December test.

January	<p>There was a high wind advisory issued on January 15th at 15:30 hours. The Kearney area received a recorded gust at 61 mile per hour on January 16th.</p> <p>In addition, on January 15th snow and ice fell which created hazardous driving conditions within Buffalo County, particularly on the interstate system.</p>
February	<p>There were two winter weather advisories during the month of February. Wind gust of 42 mph were reported and several inches of snow was predicted. However, there was very little snow fall recorded in February. The real story for February was the bitter cold temperatures with -35 degrees wind chill factor on several days.</p>
March	<p>There was one weather statement issued for high winds and a 48 mph wind gust was reported on March 26th.</p>
April	<p>Thunderstorm Watch issued on April 23rd at 1604 hours.</p> <p>Thunderstorm Warnings on:</p> <p>April 23rd at 2001 hours April 27th at 1721 hours</p> <p>A Tornado watch was issued on April 27th at 1315 hours.</p> <p>A weather statement was issued for high winds on April 13th. There was a 44 mph sustained winds reported and 62 mph wind gust reported on April 13th.</p>

Hail damage occurred in Gibbon as well as wind damage in Shelton and Gibbon.</p>
<p>July</p>	<p>Thunderstorm Watches issued on:</p> <p>July 7th at 1739 hours July 9th at 1741 hours</p> <p>Thunderstorm Warnings were issued on:</p> <p>July 7th at 1907, 1911 and 1945 hours July 9th at 1744, 1815, 1846, 1945, 2001 and 2047 hours</p> <p>Tornado Warning was issued on July 9th at 1859 hours.</p> <p>Outdoor warning sirens were sounded in Gibbon and Shelton due to large amount hail and a tornado spotted northwest of Gibbon.</p> <p>The following damage was reported:</p> <p>Hail and wind damage occurred in Buffalo county from Ravenna to south of Gibbon. Crops were destroyed anywhere from 2-10 mile wide swath for over 100 miles through the central part of Nebraska. Siding, windows and roof damage was reported in Ravenna and Gibbon as well as through rural areas along the path of the storm. Several out buildings were destroyed. Four semi-trucks were over turned by the storm and three cows were picked up and thrown onto the interstate from over a quarter mile away.</p>

Approximately 3.5 to 5 inches of rain fell in about a 45 minute time frame. Kearney Streets were flooded, causing significant damage to property homes, businesses and non-profit organizations.</p> <p>As of the end of the month approximately 6.5 million dollars in damage has been recorded in the Kearney area do to the August 8th/9th flooding event. August was a very wet month in 2014.</p>
September	There was a Tornado Watch issued on September 9 th at 15:33. There was .48 of precipitation recorded on this date. No significant weather was reported.
October	There was a Thunderstorm Watch issued on October 1 st at 23:53 and Thunderstorm warnings issued on October 1 st at, 19:42, 20:13 and 23:20 and on the 23 rd at 00:16. No significant weather damage was reported.
November	There was no severe weather to report during the month of November.
December	There was no severe weather to report during the month of December. There was two winter weather advisories issued for the Kearney / Buffalo County area for the month.

January	<p>On January 24th ice jamming issues were reported by a resident living along the North channel of the Platte River South of Gibbon on Lowell road and Kilgore road.</p> <p>Buffalo County Emergency Management checked the ice jams morning and night every day January 24th through January 31 and made the following notifications:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Nebraska Emergency Management • South Platte NRD • National Weather Service (Hastings office) • Buffalo County Sheriff • Kearney Police • Kearney Fire

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provided daily updates the Buffalo County Sheriff and the Kearney Police Chief. • Residents living along the North channel of the river were notified and informed of the ice jamming and flooding issues through flood warnings from the NWS, phone conversations with the Emergency Management office, door to door, and face to face notifications, social media through the Emergency Management Facebook page, local media and use of the Buffalo Watch notification system.
February	<p>Ice Jamming issues continued through February 18th along the North channel of the Platte River Southeast of Kearney to Shelton.</p> <p>Buffalo County Emergency Management continued to inspect the river and kept an eye on the ice jamming daily.</p> <p>Emergency notifications using the Buffalo Watch notification system was used to send out flood warnings to the residents along the river.</p> <p>Residents in the Sweetwater area had flood waters around their homes causing many of the residents to take action in protecting property and pets. Many of the residents evacuated their homes for several days until the water receded.</p>
March	No Emergency Management events reported to this office.
April	<p>On Saturday April 12th at about 0515 hours the Buffalo County Emergency Management Director received a phone call from the Nebraska Emergency Management Agency duty officer that an aircraft emergency beacon had been activated in the Kearney area.</p> <p>The Air Force was actively looking for a missing plane in the Kearney area and the Civil Air Patrol had been activated to assist in the search.</p> <p>The Emergency Management Director contacted the Buffalo County dispatch to see if they had any information/reports and briefed them on the information received. Dispatch had no reports at the time.</p> <p>The Plane was later found and determined that the emergency beacon had been left on by the planes air crew.</p> <p>On April 18th it was reported to the Buffalo County Emergency Management office of a hazmat spill due to an accident at Amherst and 355th roads. A NPPD truck pulling a trailer hauling a diesel powered man lift turned the corner and lost the lift off the trailer. It was determined 33 gallons of diesel was spilt on the roadway and in the ditch. NPPD cleaned the spill with the supervision of a Buffalo County Sheriff deputy.</p> <p>On April 21st Buffalo County Emergency Management received a call from NDEQ that Mr. Jim Bamford reported that there was an unknown</p>

	<p>substance spilt/dumped on approximately eight miles of gravel roads near 17th and Dove Hill roads Southwest of Kearney. After extensive investigation the substance was determined to be road “rock salt”.</p> <p>Over about a three day period numerous agencies were involved in the investigation:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Buffalo County Sheriff’s Office • Buffalo County Emergency Management Office • Buffalo County Highway Department • Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality • Nebraska Emergency Management Agency • Nebraska Roads Department • City of Kearney Street Department • Kearney Police Department <p>The substance (salt) was field tested and sent to an independent laboratory for testing. The test came back that the substance was indeed 98.5 percent per salt. There were no traces of any hazardous chemical component within the substance. Pictures were taken of the spillage. It has not been determined whether the spill was accidental or purposeful or who was responsible.</p> <p>All paper work was completed and submitted to the appropriate departments by this office.</p>

<p>✓ Training was set up through this office for first responder agencies with the NE State Roads Department called (TIM) Traffic Incident Management. Four separate trainings were set up I attended one of these trainings.</p>
<p>✓ I participated in a Webinar with the National Weather Service Hastings office this month. The webinar was over changes with the weather service as well as winter weather outlooks.</p>
<p>✓ Buffalo County Emergency Management started with 19 hours of flex time at the beginning of the month. Monthly Activities

- ✓ Updates, preventive maintenance, and testing were conducted two times this month on the Response Unit and the EOC. The DVR in the MRU has been ordered this month and the solid state hard drive has come in.
- ✓ ID cards were made four times during the month for jail volunteers, service providers, county employees, and Justice Center card holders.
- ✓ I conducted an Emergency Management presentation for the Leadership Kearney group. This presentation was on the EOC and emergency management operations.
- ✓ The new updated LEOP's were delivered to Kearney Public schools, Red Cross, United Way and the Community of Elm Creek. Leaving just the Communities and Miller and Riverdale to be delivered.
- ✓ The 6.5 Generator for the Recovery Unit has been taken to Buffalo Power to be fixed. The carburetor was leaking fuel.
- ✓ On November 24th it was reported to the Emergency management office that the Platte River south of Gibbon was flooding low land areas do to ice jamming. In checking the river in this area it was found to be high but going down. It was checked over the next several days with continual ice reduction and better flows.
- ✓ Captain Kirkwood and I conducted a walkthrough of the CPS chemical plant in Kearney. This was an annual walkthrough of the facility. Very little had changed maintaining the same chemicals as last year.

FLOOD GAGE MITIGATION PROJECT



After several month of preplanning with the Nebraska State Roads Department, the National Weather Service Hastings Office Buffalo County received permission to proceed with the flood gage project along the Platte River through Buffalo County. Working with the Hastings Weather Service six locations along the Platte River were surveyed for flood stage and depth elevation. After proper elevation was established depth markers with flood stage were stenciled and painted on six bridges from Shelton to Elm Creek. These gages have already proven useful over the last year.

NOTIFICATION SYSTEMS



BuffaloWatch.net a system used for cell phone, text, e-mail, and SMS messages for weather notifications, voice and landline phones for GEO notifications and pre-developed group notifications. The system has had 545 new subscribers during the year. A new public notification group was created this year, for notifying subscribed citizens of Escapes from the juvenile center in Kearney (YRTC). There are 204 residents signed up for this group notification. The desk top alert called Buffalo Alert was discontinued this year, throughout the last and prior year the company providing the desk top alert had made several changes and updates to the alert. When doing so they took much of the local flavor from the product we had originally purchase. Much of what the company was offering could be found for free on the internet. Several notifications had been sent out to the systems users letting them know of the discontinuation before the Alert was no longer available. This office did not receive any calls or concerns that this product was no longer being offered.

Buffalo County Emergency Management continues to use and improve social media notifications and information through Facebook and Twitter. The Emergency Management Facebook page now has 947 followers and when emergency's and incidents happen thousands of people within Buffalo County are reached. The page is used for weather notification, educational, planning, preparedness and recovery information. The twitter account is mainly used for weather type notification and only has about 125 individuals and/or groups following at this time.

EMERGENCY DECLARATION

- January and February 2014 Platte River Flooding Ice Jams



In the North Channel of the Platte River south of Gibbon on Lowell road and Kilgore road west to Sweetwater. Residents living along the North Channel of the river were notified and informed of the ice jamming and flooding issues through the flood warnings from the NWS, phone conversations with the emergency management office, door to door and face to face notifications, social media through the emergency management Facebook page, local media as well as through the use of the www.BuffaloWatch.net notification system. Residents in the Sweetwater area had flood waters around their homes causing many of the residents to take action in protecting property and pets. Many of the residents evacuated their homes for several days until the water receded.

- July 9th 2014 Hail and Tornado damage from North of Ravenna through South of Gibbon



Sirens were sounded in Gibbon and Shelton this month due to large amount hail and a tornado being spotted northwest of Gibbon. Hail and wind damage occurred in Buffalo county from Ravenna to South of Gibbon. Crops were destroyed anywhere from a two mile to a ten mile swath for over 100 miles through the central part of Nebraska. Siding, windows and roof damage was reported in Ravenna and Gibbon, as well as through rural areas along the path of the storm, several out buildings were destroyed, four semi's were over turned by the storm and three cows were picked up and thrown onto the interstate from over a quarter mile away.

➤ August 8th 2015 Flash Flooding In Kearney and Surrounding area



Approximately 3.5 to 5 inches of rain fell in about a 45 minute time frame. Kearney Streets were flooded, causing significant damage to property homes, businesses and non-profit organizations. There was approximately 6.5 million dollars in damage recorded in the Kearney area do to the August 8th/9th flooding event.



BUDGET

The emergency management budget for the fiscal 2013-14 year stayed under budget. The new fiscal 2014-15 budget was approved by the Board of Supervisors Budget Committee. The Buffalo County Emergency Management Department budget for 2013-14 was \$126,027.00. The 2014-15 approved budget is \$140,105.00 (an additional \$15,000.00 for a total of \$30,000.00 for carry over money for a new emergency management vehicle in the 2014-15 budget years). It is expected that another 15,000.00 will be added to the 2015-16 budget before purchasing a new EM vehicle, this was the only increase in the EM budget this year. Several areas within the budget were reduced while other areas were maintained at a 0% increase.

The EMPG (Emergency Management Performance Grant) for the fiscal year 2013 closed out and the 2014 grant started in June of 2014. This program is designed to reimburse the emergency management budget up to 50%. The total amount funded for the 2013-14 budget year is \$42,723.00. This was only about 34% of the budget for this year. The total amount fund for the 2014-15 budget years is \$37,518.00. Even though local budgets continue to go up the grant (EMPG) continues to go down. Funding for the 2014-15 budget is only 27% this only covers the salaries and benefits of the emergency manager, while in the past office support and equipment were supported by the grant as well.

This office underwent one State Audit in 2014 on Homeland Security Grants, NIMS compliance and the EM budget for the 2013 year. The audit found that all of the paperwork, documentation and equipment were in order. No discrepancies were found by the auditor.

2014 Goals

1. Continue to work with the SCPETR on regional projects to improve the region's ability to respond to, mitigate, and recover from large scale events by providing needed equipment, training and exercises to first responder agencies, volunteer organizations, elected, and appointed officials across the South Central Region.
2. Complete the five year revision of the Buffalo County LEOP.
3. Continue good working relationships with all emergency management agencies, responder agencies, volunteer organizations, private and public organizations, elected and appointed officials, and the general public at the local, state and federal levels.
4. Hold or participate in at least three exercises in 2014.
5. Continue public education campaign for 2014.
6. Put Storm Ready Signs up on major highways at the borders of Buffalo County.
7. Work with the National Weather Service, State Roads Department and the USGS office to install depth markers on all the major bridges in Buffalo County along the Platte River.
8. Start working on the process of creating a full-time Deputy position (Plans Review Specialist, Volunteer Coordinator, CERT and LEPC coordinator, and NIMS manager).
9. Transfer all old Homeland grant information from 2004 to present to the new required form put out by NEMA.

2015Goals

1. Continue to work with the SCPETR on regional projects to improve the region's ability to respond to, mitigate, and recover from large scale events by providing needed equipment, training and exercises to first responder agencies, volunteer organizations, elected, and appointed officials across the South Central Region.
2. At a minimum of once per month have contact by phone or in person, of which at least half need to be in person, with a Chief or command member of each first responder group in Buffalo County.
3. Continue good working relationships with all emergency management agencies, responder agencies, volunteer organizations, private and public organizations, elected and appointed officials, and the general public at the local, state and federal levels.
4. Re-establish working relationships between Emergency Management and Fire Departments in Buffalo County.
5. Re-evaluate all the training identified and justify why these are imperative and serve the interest of the County. Identify all planned training. Request permission to attend and justify all training to day to day supervisors before attending emergency management training.
6. Hold or participate in at least three exercises in 2015.
7. Continue public education campaign for 2015.
8. Work with the National Weather Service, State Roads Department to order and put Storm Ready Signs up on major highways at the borders of Buffalo County.
9. Work with the Sheriff and the Kearney Police Chief to develop a table top exercise for both agencies.
10. Continue working on the process of creating a full-time EM Deputy position (Plans Review Specialist, Volunteer Coordinator, CERT and LEPC coordinator, and NIMS manager).

Lastly I would like to take the opportunity to toot my own horn if I may. It is not something that I'm good at or do very often, but felt it important enough to list in this report. The Buffalo County Emergency Management Director was nominated and awarded the Emergency Management Professional of the Year for the State of Nebraska through the Nebraska Association of Emergency Managers. It is the Second time I have received this award in ten years and is very much appreciated for the recognition of my hard work and dedication over the years by my peers.
