Whereas there has been deposited in the General Land Office of the United States a certificate of the register of the Land Office at Grand Island, Nebraska, whereby it appears that, pursuant to the acts of Congress approved March 3, 1873, March 13, 1874, and June 14, 1878, "To encourage the growing of timber on the western prairies," the claim of Richard Cochring has been established and duly enumerated, in conformity to law, for the South East quarter of Section twelve in Township eleven North of Range fourteen West of the Sixth Principal Meridian in Nebraska containing one hundred and sixty acres according to the official plat of the survey of the said land, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General: Now known as, that there is, therefore granted by the United States unto the said Richard Cochring the tract of land above described: To have and to hold the said tract of land, with the appurtenances thereto, unto the said Richard Cochring and to his heirs and assigns forever.

Whereas Joseph Grammer of Buffalo County Nebraska has deposited in the  
General Land Office of the United States a certificate of the register of the Land Office  
at Grand Island, Nebraska, whereby it appears that full payment has been  
made by the said Joseph Grammer according to the provisions of the act of Con-  
gress of the 24th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale  
of the public lands, and the acts supplemental thereto, for the North West quarter  
of Section five in Township twelve North, of Range sixteen West, of the Sixth Prin-  
cipal Meridian in Nebraska, containing one hundred and fifty two acres and  
sixty two hundredths of an acre, according to the official plat of the survey of the  
said lands, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which  
said tract has been purchased by the said Joseph Grammer. Now know ye,  
that the United States of America, in consideration of the premises, and in con-  
formity with the several acts of Congress in such case made and provided, have  
given and granted, and by these presents do give and grant unto the said  
Joseph Grammer and to his heirs, the said tract above described, to have and  
to hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities and appurten-  
ances of whatever nature thereunto belonging, unto the said Joseph Grammer  
and to his heirs and assigns forever.
