For all to whom these presents shall come greeting:

Whereas there has been deposited in the General Land Office of the United States a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Grand Island, Nebraska, whereby it appears that pursuant to the act of Congress approved 20th May, 1862, "To reserve homesteads to actual settlers on the public domain," and the acts supplemental thereto, the claim of Dannel Hinde has been established and duly consummated in conformity to law, for the South West-quarter of Section fourteen in Township twelve North of Range seventeen West of the Sixth Principal Meridian in Nebraska, containing one hundred and sixty acres, according to the official plat of the survey of the said land returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General. Now know ye that there is therefore granted by the United States unto the said Dannel Hinde the tract of land above described. To have and to hold the said tract of land with the appurtenances thereof, unto the said Dannel Hinde and to his heirs and assigns forever.
