according to the Official Plat of the survey of the said land, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General:

Now Know Ye, That there is therefore granted by the United States unto the said William C. Young the tract of land above described, to have and to hold the said tract of land, with the appurtenances thereof, unto the said William C. Young and to his heirs and assigns forever.
