They help our veterans apply for and obtain disability and compensation benefits, manage their VA medical care and assist them with access to the whole spectrum of benefits available to them" said Chairman Klein of the Buffalo County Board of Commissioners.

"We are very proud and honored to participate in such a great event to show our support for our local veterans" said Chairman Klein.

"Many of our country's veterans, including those right here in Buffalo County, struggle in the transition back to civilian life. No where is that more obvious than in the high suicide rate among our veterans and they deserve better" said Matthew Starkey, Buffalo County Veteran Service Officer.

In addition to lighting county buildings, bridges, and other meaningful landmarks, residents, businesses and other organizations are encouraged to participate by simply changing one light bulb in their home to a green bulb. This can be an exterior light that neighbors and passersby see, or an interior light that sparks a conversation with friends. By shining a green light, we let our veterans know that they are seen, appreciated, and supported.
