





The Husker Beef Lab was used to teach Ruminant Nutrition, the Importance of Animal Agriculture to Nebraska and Careers in Animal Science. Randy Saner, Erin Laborie, Troy Walz and Nathan Haman all contributed to the teaching with the lab. Formal evaluations were conducted but have not been shared with the teaching teams. The beef lab continues to be a favorite session at these events. We are one of three universities that allows the public to interact with a fistulated animal, so this is really a great opportunity for students to get a "hands on" experience with a live animal in a teaching environment.

Cattleman's Affiliate Meetings

On April 4, I attended the Dawson County Cattleman's affiliate meeting in Sumner and on April 11, I attended the Lower Loup Cattleman's affiliate meeting in Pleasanton. In Sumner, Conner Biehler and I were invited to be quest speakers. I discussed "Principles of Heifer Selection" and Conner gave an overview of the "Great Plains Heifer Development Center" at the Haskell Ag Lab. In their inaugural year they are developing nearly 140 replacement heifers and utilizing the center to teach replacement heifer principles. Approximately 45 people attended the affiliate meeting. For the meeting on April 11, I helped arrange a location, invited the guest speaker and planned the meal for the Lower Loup affiliate meeting. John Schroeder, from Darr Feedlot was the invited speaker and discussed the challenges associated with finding and retaining labor. A good crowd was on hand for the Lower Loup meeting, perhaps as big a meeting as we have had for five or more years. 4-H Horse Advancement Level Testing Day

On May 21, the 4-H Horse P.A.T. offered a day where youth could come and work on their advancement levels. Specific levels are required to participate in the county fair horse show, and the State Horse Show as well as specific classes at these shows. Levels range from 1 to 4. Each level requires a set of objectives that each youth must meet. Most levels require the passing of a written test and the passing of a riding test. Some levels require a feed chart, demonstration, ration formulation, and a written report on horse breeds for example. This day was set aside for you to work on some aspects of their levels test. A total of seven youth participated in the testing day.

Professional Development

Professional Development took a significant portion of time this reporting period. PEARS training was a significant portion of the Livestock Educators Capacity Building Meeting and the Zone 3 Connection. In addition, the Livestock Capacity Building meeting was spent meeting and sharing with specialist that represent swine, manure and biologic engineering. An overview of their programs and research was helpful. I also attended the Production Animal Consultants Summit in Kearney. PAC is a group of nutritionists and veterinarians primarily, that work together to provide members and producers information on animal welfare, training and education of animal health teams, and scientific field study research. This meeting focused on the gut health for feedlot cattle, the national beef quality audit.

I also participated in four of the eight sessions of Coffee and Cattle Webinar Series. Mary Drewnoski led the seminar series that focused on annual forages. It was a great overview of stocking rates, annual forages for silage, swath grazing, and types of cool and warm season annuals and their uses. This series was a bit unique in that they began at 6:30 a.m. and lasted about 30 minutes. Attendance was good depending upon the topic but really was not significantly different than a day or nighttime webinar.


Perhaps one of the biggest professional development opportunities that educators have is the Animal Science Department Spring Beef Meetings. This year the meeting was held in the Ainsworth area. We toured the Barta Brothers Ranch and viewed their prescribed burning and yearling trials. But the biggest gain was from the presentations of the graduate students in animal science. It is a good review of the current research and its implications. Approximately 20 students and their major advisor shared what they have been working on. It does provide us information to answer clientele questions and for topics for future extension programs.

2024 TRACTOR & EQUIPMENT SAFETY TRAINING

MARK YOUR CALENDAR! COST: \$40

Federal law prohibits children under 16 years of age from using certain equipment on a farm unless their parents or legal guardians own the farm. However, certification received through this course grants an exemption to the law allowing 14- and 15-year-olds to drive a tractor and to do field work with certain mechanized equipment. Certification is earned by completing a Hands-On Safety Day with written test (Certification Day 1), then completing the Tractor and Equipment Safety Training with driving exam (Certification Day 2). Successful completion of a Certification Days 1 and 2 will result in certification for 14 and 15 year old youth to be employed on farms and ranches.

Youth <u>under 14 years</u> of age can attend Certification Day 1 **if accompanied by an adult**. They will not be able to drive equipment, attend Day 2, or become certified. Students under 14 must still register, but will not be charged the registration fee.





What is the Average Daily Gain Contest?

Excerpt from Buffalo County Fair Premium Book:

Average Daily Gain Contest

Weights collected during county weigh-in will be used to calculate average daily gain. The amount of weight gained will be divided by the number of days between the weigh-in date and weigh-in at county fair. Each exhibitor will have their highest placing beef entered into the average daily gain contest. Additionally, to be eligible to compete in the rate of gain contest, market beef animals must weigh between 900-1600 pounds. Results will be announced after the 4-H Beef Show, and premiums will be awarded to each exhibitor, with an additional monetary award given to the top 10 finishers. The top 10 awards are sponsored.





Have you ever wondered, what plant is that!?! We are excited to offer the opportunity to learn these and other important horticulture skills through the Online Horticulture Contest. More information about the Nebraska State contest along with study materials for the knowledge portion, links to plant pictures to aid in identification and insight on how judging of plant material is done at https://4h.unl.edu/online-horticulture-judging-contest

3 parts of Horticulture Judging Contest

- Identification of plant material: Participants identify the plants by common name from a plant list. Specimens may be alive or preserved plant parts like stems, twigs, leaves, flowers, seeds, fruits, roots, bulbs, tubers, or plant products.
- Knowledge: Usually in the form of a true/false or multiple choice quiz, questions will test the contestant's
 knowledge of cultural practices for horticultural crops, plant science, pesticides, horticultural careers and other
 topics related to the production, processing and consumption of horticultural crops.
- **Judging or placings:** Four different plants, plates of vegetables, or container flowers are ranked from best to worst based on a set of criteria. Classes are judged on the basis of condition, quality, uniformity, true-to-type, and size.

To be eligible, youth must be an enrolled 2024 Buffalo County member, 4-H age of 8-18, enrolled in the Food and Nutrition project area, and have met all project entry criteria and deadlines. In addition, the pie or cake must be sold by the 4-H owner who entered it. If the 4-H member is not present for the auction, they are not eligible to participate. One-half of the money raised per pie/cake will go to the pie owner and the other half will go to the Buffalo County 4-H Council scholarship fund and the FCS Project Action Team in order to fund local FCS programs. To ensure success in selling your pie, talk to businesses, family members or other interested people. Extend a personal invitation to the auction and explain its importance.


Farm Service Agency offers youth loans

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) makes loans to youth to establish and operate agricultural income-producing projects in connection with 4-H clubs, FFA and other agricultural groups. Projects must be planned and operated with the help of the organization advisor, produce sufficient income to repay the loan and provide the youth with practical business and educational experience. The maximum loan amount is \$5,000.

Youth Loan Eligibility Requirements:

- Be a citizen of the United States (which includes Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands) or a legal resident alien
- Be 10 to 20 years of age
- Comply with FSA's general eligibility requirements
- Conduct a modest income-producing project in a supervised program of work as outlined above
- Demonstrate capability of planning, managing and operating the project under guidance and assistance from a
 project advisor. The project supervisor must recommend the youth loan applicant, along with providing adequate
 supervision.
