

Whereas, there has been deposited in the General Land Office of the United States a
Certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Grand Island Nebraska, whereby it
appears that, pursuant to the act of Congress, approved 2d May, 1862, "To secure homesteads to actual settlers on the public domain," and the
acts supplemental thereto, the claim of Rhoda Breed
has been established and duly consummated in conformity to law, for the South half of the South East Quarter
of Section Eighteen in Township Nine North of Range Thirteen West, in the
district of Lands subject to sale at Grand Island Nebraska containing
eighty acres, according to the Official Plat of the Survey of the said lands returned to the
General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been purchased by
the said Rhoda Breed. Now, Know ye, that the United States of America, in consideration
of the premises, and in conformity with the general Act of Congress in such case made
and provided, have given and granted, and by these presents do give and grant, unto
the said Rhoda Breed and to her heirs, the said tract above described, to have and to
hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances,
of whatsoever nature, thereto belonging, unto the said Rhoda Breed and to her heirs and assigns
according to the Official Plat of the survey of the said land, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General.
