To all to whom these presents shall come greeting: Whereas there has been deposited in the general land office of the United States a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Grand Island, Nebraska, whereby it appears that, pursuant to the acts of Congress approved March 3, 1873, March 18, 1874 and June 14, 1878 "to encourage the growth of timber on the western prairie," the claim of Hermann Egenkirsch has been established and duly consummated, in conformity to laws for the North West quarter of Section thirty-six in Township eleven North of Range seventeen West of the Sixth Principal Meridian in Nebraska containing one hundred and sixty acres according to the official plan of the survey of the said land, returned to the general land office by the Surveyor General:

Now know ye, that there is therefore granted by the United States unto the said Hermann Egenkirsch the tract of land above described: To have and to hold the said tract of land with the appurtenances thereto unto the said Hermann Egenkirsch and to his heirs and assigns forever.

Testimony whereof I, Benjamin Harrison, President of the United States of America have caused these letters to be made Patent and the Seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.

Given under my hand at the city of Washington the thirtieth day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety two and of the Independence of the United States the one hundred and sixtieth.
