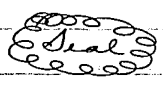

The United States of America.

To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:
 Certificate Whereas, Thomas Cahill of Buffalo County, Nebraska,
 No. 1628 has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States
 a Certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Grand Island, Nebraska
 whereby it appears that Full Payment has been made by the said Thomas
 Cahill according to the provisions of the Act of Congress of the 24th of
 April, 1870, entitled "An Act making further provision for the sale of
 the public lands", and the acts supplemental thereto, for the north half
 of the south west quarter and the north half of the south east quarter
 of section thirty in township twelve north of range fourteen, west of the
 sixth Principal Meridian, in Nebraska, containing one hundred and
 fifty nine acres and ninety eight hundredths of an acre according to the
 official Plat of the surveys of said lands, returned to the General Land
 Office by the Surveyor General, which said Tract has been purchased by the
 said Thomas Cahill. Now knowye, that the United States of America, in
 consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the several acts of Con-
 gress in such case made and provided, have given and granted, and
 by these presents do give and grant, unto the said Thomas Cahill and to his
 heirs, the said Tract above described; To Have and to Hold the same, to-
 gether with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances
 of whatsoever nature, thereto belonging, unto the said Thomas
 Cahill and to his heirs and assigns forever.

In Testimony Whereof, I, Chester A. Arthur, President of the United
 States of America, have caused these letters to be made Patent, and the
 seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.
 Given under my hand, at the City of Washington, the eleventh day
 of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and
 eighty four, and of the Independence of the United States the
 one hundred and ninth.
