Eldridge has been established and duly consummated, in conformity to law, for the North West quarter of Section Twenty One in Township Twelve North of Range Seventeen West of the Sixth Principal Meridian in Nebraska, containing one hundred and sixty acres according to the Official Plat of the survey of the said Land, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General:
