The United States of America,

To all whom these presents shall come greeting: Whereas there has been deposited in the General Land Office of the United States a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Grand Island, Nebraska, whereby it appears that, pursuant to the acts of Congress approved March 3, 1873, March 18, 1874 and June 14, 1878, "to encourage the growth of timber on the Western Prairies," the claim of Obed Riddle has been established and duly consummated in conformity to law, for the North West quarter of Section forty-six in Township twelve North, of Range thirteen West of the Sixth Principal Meridian in Nebraska, containing one hundred and sixty acres, according to the final plan of the survey of the said land, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General: Now know ye, that there is therefore granted by the United States unto the said Obed Riddle the tract of land above described: To have and to hold the said tract of land with the appurtenances thereto, unto the said Obed Riddle and to his heirs and assigns forever.

In testimony whereof, C. Benjamin Harrison, President of the United States of America, has caused these letters to be made patent, and the Seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.

Given under my hand, at the city of Washington, the fourth day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety, and of the Independence of the United States the one hundred and fourteenth.
