Patent. Continuation of No. 627 The United States of America,

Application 3677. To all to whom these presents shall come, greeting.

Whereas there has been deposited in the General Land Office of the United States a certificate of the register of the Land Office at Grand Island, Nebraska whereby it appears that, pursuant to the acts of Congress approved March 3, 1873, March 13, 1874, and June 14, 1878, "To encourage the growth of timber on the western prairies," the claim of Joseph W. Stevens has been established and duly consummated, in conformity to law for the North East quarter of Section thirty in township eleven North of Range eighteen West of the Fifth Principal Meridian in Nebraska, containing one hundred and sixty acres according to the official plat of the survey of the said land, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General: Now know ye, that there is, therefore granted by the United States unto the said Joseph W. Stevens the tract of land above described: To have and to hold the said tract of land, with the appurtenances thereof, unto the said Joseph W. Stevens and to his heirs and assigns forever.

In testimony whereof, I, Benjamin Harrison, President of the United States of America, have caused these letters to be made patent, and the seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.
