To all to whom these presents shall come greeting,
 Certificate No 3802. Whereas John C. Stevenson of Buffalo
 County Nebraska has deposited in the General Land Office
 of the United ^{States} a Certificate of the Register of the Land Office
 at Grand Island Nebraska whereby it appears that full
 payment has been made by the said John C. Stevenson
 according to the provisions of the Act of Congress of the
 24th of April, 1890 entitled "An Act making further pro-
 vision for the sale of the Public Lands" and the acts supple-
 mental thereto for the East Half of the South West Quarter
 and the Lots numbered three and four of Section Eighteen
 in Township Ten North of Range Seventeen West of
 the Sixth Principal Meridian, in Nebraska containing
 One Hundred and fifty seven acres and Eighty
 Hundredths of an acre, according to the Official
 Plot of the Survey of the said lands, returned to the
 General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said
 Tract has been purchased by the said John C. Stevenson.

Now Know ye, That the United States of America
 in consideration of the premises, and in conformity
 with the several Acts of Congress in such case made
 and provided, Have given and granted, and by these
 presents Do give and grant, unto the said John C. Steven-
 son, and to his heirs, the said Tract above described,
 To have and to hold the same together with all the rights
 privileges, immunities, and appurtenances, of whatever
 nature, thereto belonging, unto the said John C. Stevenson
 and to his heirs and assigns forever.

In Testimony Whereof, J. Benjamin Harrison President
 of the United States of America, have caused these letters
 to be made patent, and the seal of the General Land
 Office to be hereunto affixed.
