

The United States of America, To all to whom these Presents shall come,
 Greeting: Whereas, In pursuance of the Act of Congress, approved July 2
 1862, entitled "An act donating Public Lands to the several States and
 Territories which may provide colleges for the benefit of Agriculture and
 the Mechanic Arts," there has been deposited in the General Land
 Office scrip No. 606, for one quarter section of Land, in favor of the
 State of Virginia, duly assigned by the proper authority of the said
 State to Willmott P. Trew with evidence that the same has been lo-
 cated upon the South East quarter of Section twelve, in Township
 nine North of Range fourteen West, in the District of Lands subject
 to sale at Grand Island Nebraska containing one hundred and
 sixty acres, according to the Official Plat of the Survey of the said
 Land returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General:

Now know ye, that there is therefore granted by the United
 States unto the said Willmott P. Trew as assignee as aforesaid, and
 to his heirs the tract of land above described: To have and to hold
 the said tract of Land, with the appurtenances thereof, unto the
 said Willmott P. Trew as assignee as aforesaid and to his heirs
 and assigns forever.

In testimony whereof, I Ulysses S. Grant, President of the
 United States of America, have caused these Letters to be made Pat-
 ent, and the Seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto aff-
 ixed.
