To all to whom these presents shall come greeting.

Whereas there has been deposited in the general land office of the United States a certificate of the register of the Land Office at Grand Island, Nebraska, whereby it appears that pursuant to the acts of Congress approved March 2, 1872, March 13, 1874, and June 14, 1878, "To encourage the growth of timber on the western prairies the claim of Albert Tuttle has been established and duly consummated, in conformity to law, for the North West-quarter of Section eight in Township ten North of Range eighteen West of the Sixth Principal Meridian in Nebraska, containing one hundred and sixty acres, according to the official plat of the survey of the said land, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General;

Now know ye, that there is, therefore, granted by the United States unto the said Albert Tuttle the tract of land above described: To have and to hold the said tract of land, with the appurtenances thereof, unto the said Albert Tuttle and to his heirs and assigns forever. In testimony whereof, I Benjamin Harrison, President of the United States of America have caused these letters to be made patent, and the seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed. Given under my hand at the city of Washington the twenty-third day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and of the Independence of the United States the one hundred and fiftenth.
